Every meal has a story. Meet Helen.

In 2020, Helen was diagnosed with cancer. Her world turned upside down in what seemed like a blink of an eye. Before getting sick, she owned her own window cleaning business. She never needed to visit a food pantry for herself and didn't receive SNAP food benefits.

Helen's initial cancer treatments began in the morning and lasted into the evening. Not only did she no longer have time to work, but she was too ill for physical labor. One day, while driving down the street after a treatment, she saw a long line of cars waiting to receive food from a drivethru food pantry.

She started visiting the pantry to help make ends meet while she navigated a new budget and lifestyle. The food pantry provided her with fresh fruits, vegetables, meat and pantry staples. But it also provided her with new friendships and support.

"This place has been here for me in my lowest of lows and my highest of highs," she said. "This place has a real special place in my heart."

Helen is still receiving cancer treatments and surgeries. She has struggled to find a job willing to work with her treatment schedule. When she needs a little help with groceries, she knows the pantry is there for her with open arms.

Throughout her emotional health journey, Helen has remained positive. When she has the time, she helps volunteer at the same pantry that supports her.

Helen says to supporters of the Foodbank and local hunger relief, "I love you. Thank you. If the world worked together like this food pantry, it would be a better place."

Local family makes significant impact for Foodbank

The Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank is extremely grateful to call Dave and Cheryl Venarge good friends. Their extensive commitment to hunger relief compelled them to make a significant donation to the Foodbank's capital campaign, with the new onsite food pantry at the Main Campus in Akron being named in their family's honor. Dave and Cheryl also established an endowment fund, helping to ensure their faithful support to the Foodbank will continue in perpetuity.

The new pantry, now open, is named The Venarge Family Food Pantry & Resource Center. It will serve families with groceries and other support services through community partnerships.

"Having the pantry named after our family is a legacy we can be very proud of, all the way through our grandchildren and those who come after them," said Cheryl.

The Venarge's passion for fighting hunger runs deep. Both growing up in single-parent homes, Dave and Cheryl know firsthand how important it is to have access to nourishing, consistent food.

Cheryl, though retired, has made it her personal mission to feed school children in the Akron Public School district. On a Saturday morning, you can find Cheryl, her family and friends packing 200 weekend food bags for children they'll never meet. Sourcing the food, packing and delivering the bags — Cheryl does it all.

"Finding food for kids keeps us busy! We talk about food insecurity a lot — this is what we do. It's a part of our lives," she said.



You can also find Cheryl at the Foodbank's Main Campus in Akron a few times per month. She is a dedicated volunteer who has helped in the warehouse, at drive-thru distributions, and is someone we

rely heavily on for administrative support. She also plans to be a regular, friendly face in the new food pantry.

The Venarge's have passed their philanthropic spirit to their children and six granddaughters. It's become an annual tradition for the girls, now ages 12 to 21, to convene at the Akron Community Foundation to help determine what organizations their grandparents grant money to each year. They receive grant proposals and hear presentations on each charity before deciding which charities to support. They have also visited some of the organizations to see their impact firsthand.

"We think it's very important for the children to be aware of their surroundings — to see firsthand what is going on in their community," said Dave.

Our community is lucky to have such a generous and dedicated couple like Dave and Cheryl who are willing to support local causes both financially and with their time and talents. Thank you, Dave and Cheryl, for making a significant impact on hunger in our community!

A note from Foodbank president & CEO

As we reflect on 2023, I want to highlight a few things I believe will define the year in the history of the Foodbank. The headline is, without question, the record surge in the number of people seeking emergency food assistance. The reduction of pandemicera benefits combined with the surge in costs caused by inflation was an overwhelming mix for many people in our community. We have seen a nearly 30% increase in the number of people visiting food programs in our network, when comparing this year to last. In partnership with our network, we served more people in 2023 than any year of the pandemic — more than any period in our 41-year history.

This sharp increase in demand, although clearly driven by factors established during the pandemic, took place in the context of an inching recovery in other areas. The supply chain, so disrupted in the past few years, started to resemble some of its pre-pandemic reliability. This led to an increase in food donations and during the last two quarters of 2023, we saw food donations begin to stabilize. But the 15% increase in food donations we managed to gather was not enough to cover the monumental 30% increase in demand. All of this took place in a dramatically higher cost environment. There's definitely work to do, and we're in a great place to do it.

Those of you who regularly visit our facilities have seen the new Stark County Campus, opened in 2021, and have observed the expansion and remodeling of the Main Campus in Akron. The completion of the two construction projects culminated with a ribbon cutting in Akron this month, thus concluding eight years of capital planning, fundraising and building projects. Our entire infrastructure has been rebuilt. We have tenured staff who know the work, our volunteer workforce is returning to its former strength and our board leadership is second to none.

A day never passes that we aren't grateful for the generosity of our supporters and hunger-relief partners who make this work happen. There would simply not be a strong food bank acting as a safety net for families struggling in this community were it not for you. That is the bottom line. We work for you. We work to deliver on our shared vision of a thriving community free of hunger. We have been the difference between hunger, homelessness and utility shut-off notices for thousands of our neighbors in 2023. With your faithful support, we can meet the challenges of inflation and whatever comes next, and continue to be a cornerstone of hope and stability in this community for generations to come.

If no one has told you they love you today, let me close by telling you that the Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank loves you. We really do.

Local couple turns hardship into caring for their community

Hunger-relief partners in the Foodbank's network are dedicated to the local fight against hunger; operating a food program requires a compassionate heart. The support and love they extend to our neighbors embody the true spirit of service, offering hope and nourishment to families in need. Some run a food pantry out of pure kindness, while others do so from a place of empathy, having known the struggle of hunger firsthand.

Bob and Phyllis are a married couple who both experienced hunger while growing up. Phyllis' father was a coal miner and faced frequent layoffs, while Bob's family encountered food insecurity after his father passed away and his mother was pregnant with her fourth child. Both remember receiving free canned food, powdered milk and rice to make it by.

"We both grew up not having much," recounts Bob.

Now in their 70s, Bob and Phyllis dedicate their time to feeding their neighbors in Medina County. As codirectors of Brunswick Food Pantry, they serve approximately 1,500

families annually, including retired adults living on fixed incomes in nearby senior living communities.

The food pantry takes into account dietary needs and cultural preferences. They strive to provide low-sugar, glutenfree options and culturally preferred foods to the people they serve.

"We have two clients that, for religious purposes, do not eat any meat. So, when they come in, we just ask them, 'What would you prefer today?'" Phyllis says. "We'll give them extra canned vegetables and other groceries."

The food pantry supports families beyond food, providing essential items like diapers for children and adults, personal hygiene products and other necessities. Most of these items are not covered by SNAP benefits.

Bob and Phyllis have been helping with the pantry for 23 years. Over the past few decades, the pair has helped build strong relationships with the community. The food pantry thrives with support from their city, local organizations, businesses, other emergency food programs and their partnership with the Foodbank.

The Foodbank is so thankful for Brunswick Food Pantry's hard work and commitment to local hunger relief.
